Keith Alexander Taylor passed away March 24th in Halifax, surrounded by family. He was the eldest son of Alex and Marion Taylor (nee Keith). He is survived by his longtime partner Peggy Martin, his brother Paul (Mary Jane), sisters-in-law, Pat (Brian), Jeanne (Dave), and numerous nieces and nephews.

Keith was raised in Dartmouth and graduated from Dalhousie University with a BSc in geology. He then began a 30-year career in earth sciences at Dalhousie, where he created and operated radiometric and electron microprobe equipment.

He enjoyed many outdoor activities, nature and spending time at home by the lake. Together, he and Peg enjoyed such activities as biking in Europe, canoeing through Keji, skiing into Skoki Lodge in Alberta, sliding down the slopes of Mont St Anne, trout fishing with his brother at Long Lo, sailing the Northwest Arm, skating on Grand Lake or

hiking the trails of Cape Breton. Weather was never an impediment as they subscribed to the rule of “there is no such thing as bad weather, just bad equipment”. Countless hours have been spent in these pursuits in the company of family and friends, particularly the “Gonzos”. Seldom were they without their long line of faithful golden retrievers by their sides.

He enjoyed music and regularly attended performances of Symphony Nova Scotia, and was also a patron of Neptune Theatre. Other interests included building fine wood cabinets, photography and playing many years of gentleman’s hockey at noon at Dalhousie and with the “Canadian Tireds”.
